Last November the Qawalangin Tribe met with representatives from ADEC and EPA in Anchorage to discuss water quality issues here in Unalaska Bay. During the meeting the Qawalangin Tribe urged the EPA and ADEC to take responsibility for protecting water quality and public health in Unalaska. They indicated that a public meeting in the community

would help alleviate some of the burden placed on the tribe to address water quality and related food security and public health issues. The best time to visit the community was during the A season in January/February. Therefore, on February 22nd and 23rd, Michelle Hale and Clynda Case of ADEC travelled to Unalaska to meet with the

community and tribal members. Topics that were discussed were the Onshore Seafood Processing General Permit and tribal concerns about seafood processing waste in Unalaska Bay. During their time in Unalaska the ADEC reps were impressed by the public's concerns and knowledge of the issues. The tribe is preparing comments for the upcoming comment period later this summer. If you have questions or concerns about seafood processing waste and how it may impact our bay, call us at the tribe and we can make sure all comments and concerns are addressed.

SHARC Cards Survey

2016 permits will be contacted to fill out the survey. For this survey, she will need assistance from one or two locals who are familiar with the community. Training will be provided on April 7th and the pay is \$100 for the training plus \$15 per survey completed. The

Get to know your President! Thomas Robinson is the elected President of the Qawalangin Tribe of Unalaska. He was recently elected to the National Tribal Operations Committee (NTOC) for EPA's Alaska Seat. As the NTOC representative, Tom seeks to address environmental capacity

building, conservation goals, and fisheries resource protection for all Alaskan tribes. Tom will be giving a presentation at the Tribal Leaders Summit in Port Gamble on March 30th, hosted by the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe addressing a national audience. He will be discussing the long-term health of Unalaska Bay and the work being done by the tribe to address environmental concerns. He is also the Aleutian Regional Representative for the Alaska Tribal Budget Advisory Committee, addressing statewide unmet needs assessments with the BIA and the Department of Interior. He is the Qawalangin Tribe

representative tasked with addressing current "Land into Trust" issues. He serves on the Unalaska Native Fisherman's Association and is on the Board of Directors of the Aleutian Pribilof Islands Association. Tom also serves on the Aleutian Islands Risk Assessment Committee. Tom has over 30 years of commercial fishing experience and is a small business owner. Tom encourages tribal member input at all levels.

Commemoration of the 75th Anniversary of the Bombing of Dutch Harbor and Aleut Evacuation

Many members of the community have grown up listening to solemn tales of the Aleut evacuation and internment, and some of our community members have lived through it. This year marks the 75th anniversary since the Unangaġ people have experienced war on home soil, and this is the year we celebrate our strength.

In the year of 1942, 881 people from nine Aleutian villages were evacuated from their homes and transported to Southeast Alaska by the United States military. Despite these tragic events and losses of loved ones, the Unangaġ survivors have proven their might by continuing to pass down our culture and way of life. The wisdom of our elders is invaluable, and this commemoration is a way for all of us to honor them and their stories.

As we prepare for the Commemoration, we will be interviewing and writing articles on Unangaġ survivors of the WWII internment. We understand this can be a difficult topic for many to talk about, but this crucial and important piece of our history deserves to be acknowledged. The Alaska Youth for Environmental Action (AYEA) is a State-Wide youth organization [1]. UCSD has an Unalaska chapter advised by Mr. Holloway. The Qawalangin Tribe Youth Environmental Leadership Council

(QT-YELC) joined the AYE group and Leticia Pureza plays the role of QT-YELC advisor.

This year, the group is focusing on the Save Our Salmon (S.O.S) campaign as a statewide effort, and promoting a cleaner Unalaska as a local effort. Through the S.O.S campaign, the youth are collecting signatures for petitions to stop the Chuitna Coal Mine. If approved, this project would set a dangerous precedent for salmon streams and rivers in Alaska [1].

The group has already organized a beach clean-up in December of 2016 (see picture). They also

plan to participate on the Annual Community clean-up in May and, possibly, organize an additional clean-up. The group will also have a **bake sale at Safeway on April 1**. All funds will be returned to the community as a group environmental activity.

High-Schoolers: this is a great way to log in your community volunteer hours if you need them! The group meets twice a month on Mondays during lunch break (12:25 pm – 12: 55pm) in Mr. Holloway’s classroom. Pizza is provided for lunch. All youth are welcome to participate.

WAISC in Unalaska



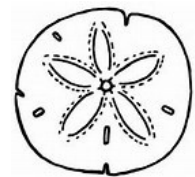

The annual Western Alaska Interdisciplinary Science Conference and Forum (WAISC) will be held in Unalaska this year. It will be on April 26-29 at the Grand Aleutian. Please see the short overview by Melissa Good, from

the Alaska Sea Grant Marine Advisory Program: “Western Alaska is experiencing a period of rapid change. Temperatures are warming, the ocean is becoming more acidic, and species are shifting in time and space. Environmental and economic fluctuations caused by a changing environment lead to risks, threats, and impacts, but change can also bring opportunities and new developments/transformations. WAISC seeks to bring scientists, resource manag-

ers, industry experts, fishery business enthusiasts, seafood product development/safety specialists and resource users together to share the state-of-the-science, the latest innovations in technology, and local observations, and to discuss the needs and concerns of each stakeholder group.”
